Dear Excavation Director,

One of your American student volunteers is under consideration for the Cohen Family American Archaeology Abroad Fellowship offered through our organization. This fellowship program is designed to award a \$1500 stipend to help cover expenses associated with participation in an archaeological field project.

As a fellow, the student will be required to submit a weekly blog about his/her experiences working on an archaeological excavation abroad. Additionally, the student will be required to submit a final report after the field season detailing his/her experiences. Both the blog and the report will be posted on our website.

Of course, the academic activity which takes place on an excavation is the intellectual property of the director and staff of the excavation. We therefore require potential fellows to secure the permission of the director(s) to fulfill these fellowship requirements. Without your explicit permission, the student is ineligible for the fellowship. Your approval can be given by sending an email to me at mja198@gmail.com.

What is American Archaeology Abroad?

We are a non-profit organization formed to advance archaeological and historical knowledge about the past and to educate the public about the past and how it is studied. We pursue these goals through archaeological and historical research and excavation, sponsoring student scholarships, and including students and public volunteers in our lecture and research programs. Most members of the board of directors are PhDs working in Egypt, Greece, and Israel.

Why should I participate in this fellowship program?

The fellowship program is designed to identify and financially support future archaeologists who exhibit great potential. The blog and reports are intended to help the student maximize his/her excavation experience by reflecting on what academic work is underway in the field and why.

The program is also designed to help AAA forge new relationships with excavations such as yours. These new relationships serve all of our interests in promoting archaeology and education, advertising our respective excavations and organizations, and promoting interdisciplinary and cross-regional communication.

Benefits for your excavation project

Along with approving the requirements for this fellowship, you and your excavation will be partnering with our organization to encourage American student and public participation in archaeological excavation. Such visibility will expand your excavation's potential for volunteer and financial support from this constituency.

How does this all work?

By agreeing to the terms of the fellowship program, you allow the recipient of the fellowship to publish a weekly blog and final report on our website about his/her experiences on your excavation. Before posting the text and images submitted by the student on the site, we will send a draft to you or your deputy for approval. You may veto any images or references to activities or discoveries that you wish. We will provide information about your excavation, including links to your website, at the top of the blog. You may also wish to link to the blog from your own website.
